SUBJECT: **8:00 PM Time Certain: Public Hearing #5** – Conduct Public Hearing to Receive Public Input on District Boundaries and First Reading of Ordinance No. 997, to be Read by Title Only and Waive Further Reading, Adjusting the Boundaries of the Four City Council Districts and Adopting a New Official Council District Map Based on the Results of the 2020 Decennial Census. **(ORDINANCE NO. 997)** (CITY)

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council receive a report from staff, conduct a public hearing to receive public input, and introduce first reading of Ordinance No. 997, to be read by title only and waive further reading, adjusting the boundaries of the four City Council Districts and adopting a new official Council District Map for the City of Rancho Cucamonga based on the results of the 2020 decennial census.

BACKGROUND:

On November 8, 2016, the voters of Rancho Cucamonga approved Ordinance No. 887, providing for the election of four members of the City Council by four districts, with a Mayor elected at large, and establishing the boundaries and election order of each district. At that time, the Council districts were drawn using the 2010 Census data as was required by law.

Following each U.S. Census, which occurs every ten years, cities with by-district election systems must use the new census data to review and, if needed, redraw district lines to reflect how local populations have changed. This process, called redistricting, ensures all districts have nearly equal population.

By law, the City must hold at least four (4) public hearings that enable community members to provide input on the drawing of district maps. At least one hearing must occur before the city or county draws draft maps. At least two public hearings must occur after the drawing of draft maps. The Government Code requires that a final map be adopted and submitted to the County no later than April 18, 2022.

The City scheduled five (5) hearing dates for the Council Redistricting process and conducted extensive community outreach efforts. Four public hearings took place on September 15, 2021, November 3, 2021, January 19, 2022, February 2, 2022, with the last hearing taking place on March 2, 2022 at 8:00 PM. Recordings and informational materials for those hearings are available at www.drawrc.org.

The districts must be redrawn using the 2020 census data and in compliance with the Fair Maps Act, which was adopted by the California Legislature as AB 849 and took effect January 1, 2020. Under the Act, the Council shall draw and adopt boundaries using the following criteria in the listed order of priority in accordance with Elections Code 21601(c):

1. Comply with the federal requirements of equal population and the Voting Rights Act
2. Geographically contiguous
3. Undivided neighborhoods and “communities of interest” (socio-economic geographic areas that should be kept together)
4. Easily identifiable boundaries
5. Compact (do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)
6. Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party

Once the prioritized criteria are met, other traditional districting principles can be considered, such as:

1. Minimize the number of voters delayed from voting in 2022 to 2024
2. Respect voters’ choices / continuity in office
3. Future population growth

As of the date of this report, only one map was submitted by the public and provided to the City Council with the February 2, 2022 City Council meeting Staff Report, including the City’s demographer’s review of the map, with the associated data.

Additionally, and in accordance with the Mutual Release and Settlement Agreement and Amendment entered with the Southwest Voter Registration Project (“SVREP”) and Louisa Ollague (Collectively “Plaintiff”), the City submitted a draft map to the Plaintiff on October 29, 2021 for their review and consideration. Subsequently, ongoing discussions and reviews took place. Map 105 was developed, and the parties have indicated their agreement to submit this map to the City Council in accordance with the settlement agreement. This draft map meets the required federal and state criteria and would make minimal changes to the existing City Council District boundaries.

At the last City Council Meeting on February 2, 2022, the City Council gave direction to move forward with Map 105 as its preferred map and directed staff to prepare the final map and ordinance for first reading at its March 2, 2022 City Council meeting.

ANALYSIS:

The purpose of Public Hearing #5 is to receive public input, review any map drafts received from the public to date and conduct first reading of Ordinance No. 997, adjusting the boundaries of the four City Council Districts and adopting a new official Council District Map based on the results of the 2020 decennial census.

Some of the major components and highlights of the proposed map include:

- Having a balanced population between districts;
- Having compact geographical shapes for Fair Map Act purposes and requirements;
- Avoids separating communities of interest; maintains the more modern/post incorporation of planned communities of Terra Vista and Victoria more fully intact in District 3;
- Pushes District 2 boundary north of Foothill all the way to Base Line between Hellman and Hermosa for optimum density, and creating an area of highest Latino Citizen Voting Age Population (CVAP) at 44%;
- District 4 boundary is revised for better population balance between Districts;

Map 105 is in compliance with the various legal requirements as noted above, and is now proposed for adoption. Election sequencing has not changed and will be in accordance with Rancho Cucamonga Municipal Code Section 2.11, which in summary provides that elections for the Council seats in Districts 2 and 3 will be held every four years beginning in November 2018, along with the election of Mayor. The elections for Districts 1 and 4 will be held every four years beginning in November 2020. The district numbers in proposed map align with the current district numbers of districts that generally align with the same territory.

The attached ordinance is presented for the City Council's consideration in adopting the preferred map, Map 105, as the City Council District Map.

No additional public comments nor maps have been received since the last hearing date. The public is encouraged to participate in the hearing.

ORDINANCE NO. 997

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF RANCHO CUCAMONGA, CALIFORNIA, ADJUSTING THE BOUNDARIES OF THE FOUR CITY COUNCIL DISTRICTS AND ADOPTING A NEW OFFICIAL COUNCIL DISTRICT MAP FOR THE CITY OF RANCHO CUCAMONGA BASED ON THE RESULTS OF THE 2020 DECENNIAL CENSUS

A. Recitals.

1. On November 8, 2016 the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 887 pursuant to Government Code Sections 34871 and 34872 to add Chapter 2.11 to the Rancho Cucamonga Municipal Code to provide for the by-district election of members of the City Council and at-large election of the Mayor, adopt the official Council District Map for the City of Rancho Cucamonga, establish the boundaries and identification number of each electoral district, and establish a sequencing of elections for each Council District.

2. Pursuant to Elections Code Section 21601 and Section 2.11.050 of the Rancho Cucamonga Municipal Code, the City Council is required to adjust the boundaries of any or all of the Council Districts following each decennial federal census. Using the census as a basis, the City Council must adjust the boundaries so that the Council Districts are as nearly equal in population as practicable and in compliance with all applicable provisions of law, including the United States and Federal Constitutions and the Federal Voting Rights Act of 1965 (52 U.S.C. Section 10301 et seq.).

3. In accordance with Elections Code Section 21607 and 21607.1, the City Council held public hearings on the drawing of district boundaries on September 15, 2021, November 3, 2021, January 19, 2022, February 2, 2022, and March 2, 2022. At each of the foregoing hearings, the public was invited to provide input on the composition of the new Council District boundaries.

4. After closing the public hearing held on March 2, 2022, the City Council selected the map depicted in Exhibit "A" of this Ordinance and incorporated herein by this reference as the official Council District Map for the City of Rancho Cucamonga and introduced this Ordinance for first reading. Demographic data supporting the map based on the 2020 Census is attached hereto as Exhibit "B" of this Ordinance and incorporated herein by this reference.

B. Ordinance.

The City Council of the City of Rancho Cucamonga does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. The map attached hereto as Exhibit "A" to this Ordinance is hereby approved and adopted as the Official Council District Map for the City of Rancho Cucamonga and shall be used in the 2022 general municipal election and all such elections for City Council thereafter, until further amended.

SECTION 2. Section 2.11.020 of Chapter 2.11 of the Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

"2.11.020 City Council Districts Established. The boundaries for the four (4) City Council districts and the identification number of each district shall be as described on

the Official Council District Map for the City of Rancho Cucamonga, attached as Exhibit "A" to Ordinance No. 997 and incorporated herein by this reference. A copy of the Council District Map is on file in the Office of the City Clerk."

SECTION 3. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall nonetheless remain in full force and effect. The City Council of the City of Rancho Cucamonga hereby declares that it would have adopted each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions of this Ordinance be declared invalid or unenforceable.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published in the manner prescribed by law.

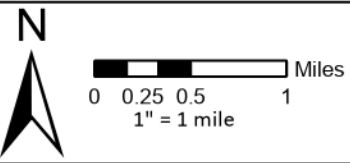
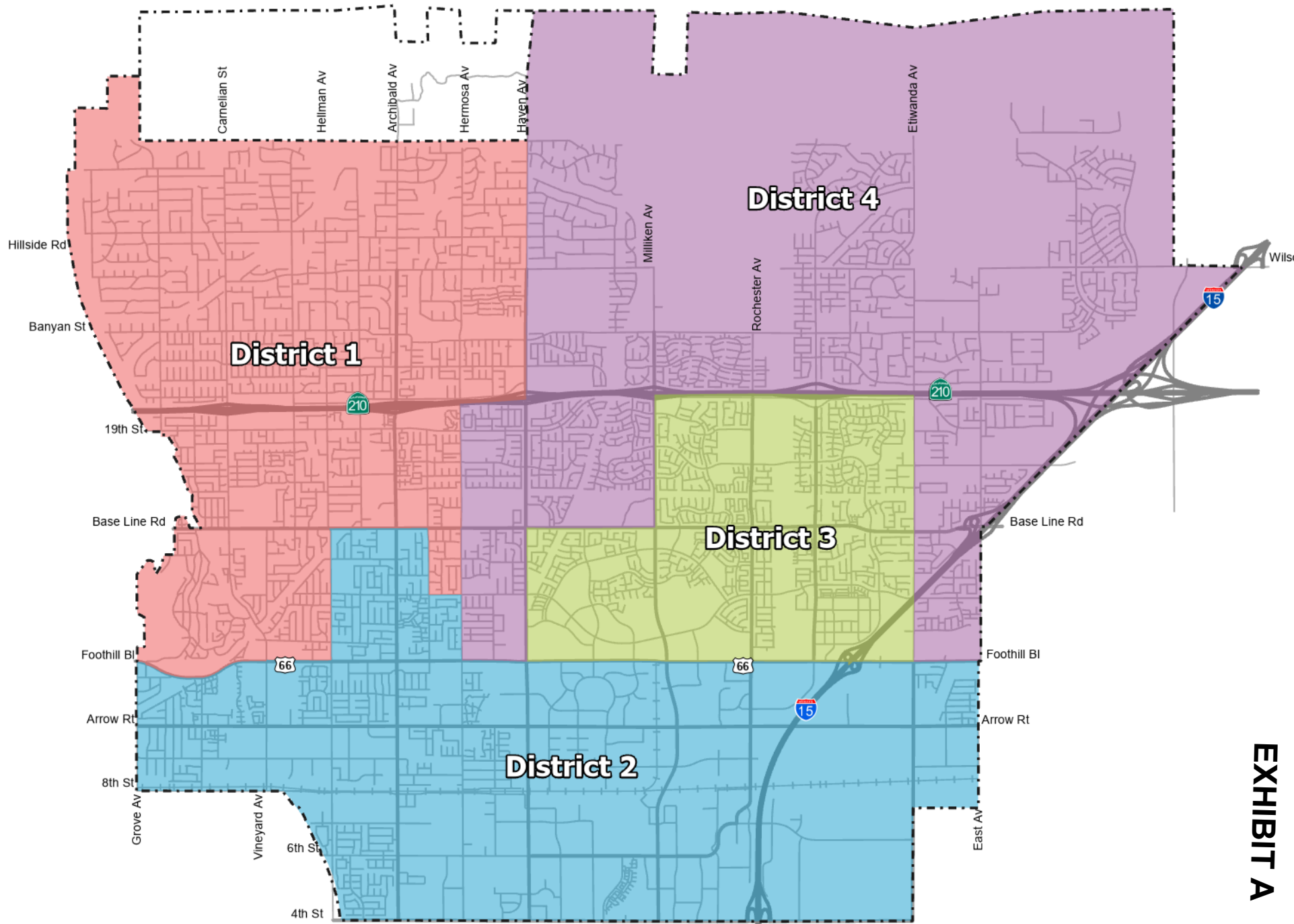
